[This is an American version.] The song refers obliquely to the knocking shops of The Barbary Coast, which was a red-light district in old San Francisco, California. The neighbourhood quickly took on its seedy character during the California Gold Rush (1848–1858) and was known for gambling, prostitution and crime.

The name **Midway Plaisance** was later taken by an area of south-side Chicago, originally known (from the World's Columbian Exhibition in 1893) for its amusements and sideshows.
